### Children from Birth - Age 11



Seventy five years ago, Carl Farinacci's Aunt Margaret moved into a home on Darrow Road—"when it was still chips and tar, two lanes with no cars"—across the street from the library.

Some of his earliest memories are of Margaret, ever the avid reader, striding across the street in the 1940s "with armloads of books," a practice she continued until her death in 2006.

Even though Carl didn't grow up in Stow, he has been "in and out of the library" with his four cousins since childhood and has a strong connection to it.

In 2014, Carl donated money to renovate a quiet study room in Margaret's memory—which he said she would have loved seeing in use. Now, he's donated again to buy two individual study pods. We thanked Carl for his donation by hosting a ribbon cutting ceremony.

The pods are about the size of a phone booth, are available on a first-come, first-serve basis, and are perfect for independent study or Zoom calls.











## **Book Discussions**


## **Bird Watching Week**

## Amateur Photography Contest

### How to enter:

- Submit your photos to the Adult/Teen or Children's Information Desks during library hours on Wed., July 6 -Sat., July 9, 2022. No late entries accepted. Click here or visit events.smfpl.org for entry forms.
- Maximum number of entries is two per person. They can be in the same or different photo categories.
- Age categories are: Adult (18+), Teen (12 17), Children (7 11), and Lil' Snapper (1 6). The Lil' Snapper age group is a non-judged open division, an opportunity for budding young photographers to showcase their first photos.
- Photo categories are: People, Animals, and Nature/ Landscapes (includes buildings). Judges may recategorize photos if necessary.
- Photos must be 5x7" prints and matted in an 8x10"
  matte board only (matte boards available at hobby
  stores). Use a separate entry form for each photo and tape
  completed form to the back of the matte board. A sample
  matted photo is available at either Information Desk. Entry
  forms will also be available at the Information Desks, and on
  the library's website to download and print.

There will be three **prizes** per category and age group, compliments of the Friends of the Library:


First Place	\$20





## In the Beginning

Do you remember your very first visit to the Stow-Munroe Falls Public Library? I once had a friend named Charles who lived within walking distance of our library. Although I never saw it, he loved to tell me that he owned one of the very first library cards issued here at Stow Library. Charles was a kindred spirit, and I was amazed by his keepsake, thinking that perhaps I was the only one sentimental enough to save my childhood card from the Stow Library. Having grown up in different generations, Charles had a unique perspective and a rich history with Stow. His memories and stories about our library and the community painted vivid pictures, and I'm grateful not only for his friendship, but also for his connection to our distant past. As the library quickly approaches its one hundredth anniversary, let's take a walk down memory lane to visit the library that Charles knew and loved.

Turn back the hands of time to the 1920s and 1930s, and imagine two small towns buzzing with cultural, social, and civic activities. That was the early beginnings of the Stow Civic Association, the 4-H Club, Daughters of the American Revolution, the Parent-Teacher Association, the Stow Republican Club, the Stow Businessmen's Association, and the Munroe Falls Civic Association.

At the time, Stow was a sleepy rural community complete with small grocery stores, a variety store, two drug stores, two dairies, two plumbing shops, a greenhouse, two barber shops, a shoe shop, a general feed store, several restaurants, an automotive body repair shop, two garages, a few specialty shops, and a small public library.

This small public library was a school district library with a board of trustees appointed by the school board. Founded in 1924, Stow Public Library organized and held its opening

night on January 21, 1925. The opening of the library was quite an accomplishment for these two small communities with a combined population of only about 3,000 during the mid-1920s.

Stow Public Library was originally located within the town hall at 3493 Darrow Road. It was staffed by its first librarian, Mrs. Jessie Williamson. Responsible for the grade school library, high school library, and the Stow Public Library, Mrs. Williamson worked hard for her annual salary of just \$1,200.

After a year of operation, the library held a modest collection of 2,200 volumes. The Bible, History of the United States, Webster's New Standard Dictionary, World Book, Field Book of American Trees and Shrubs, and the International Who's Who in Music were part of the early collection. Popular series found their way into the library including Dr. Doolittle, Tom Swift, the Bobbsey Twins, Pollyanna, Curlytops, and Zane Gray. One sex education book was tucked quietly within the book stacks.

The library grew and the word spread about this exciting new small-town library. By the end of 1930, one out of every three Stow and Munroe Falls residents had a library card. Circulation was 10,849 in 1926, jumping to 23,071 in 1929. During the first year of the Great Depression, Stow Public Library was moved from town hall to 122 Hudson Road (now Darrow Road) near its present location across from the First Christian Church. The lot and house were purchased from Clara M. Bradley for a sum of \$8,150. The library re-opened to the public in December 1930.

The new library was composed of three rooms downstairs. Imagine the traffic of 1,273 library cardholders through a residential-size building. The largest room, originally a living and dining room, housed bookshelves around the walls and tables and chairs for patrons. The second room was the Children's Department, and the third room was a small library



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office. The upstairs was converted into an apartment for the librarian, who was charged \$20 per month for rent.

Salaries and wages grew from \$1,440 in 1926 to \$1,849 in 1930. Librarians Louise Thomson and Nellie Glass followed Mrs. Williamson. Fringe benefits for the librarian included a two-week vacation after one year of employment, but there was only one catch: the librarian had to find her own replacement and pay her wage.

In the fall of 1930, the Stow Public Library staff was increased to two members: one full-time librarian and one part-time assistant librarian. Mrs. Pace was hired as part time assistant at a wage of \$30/month. The library continued to function without the use of a telephone which wasn't installed until 1950.

The Garden Club planted flowers around the library entrance and was granted use of the library on Friday evenings for its meetings. A groundskeeper was later hired to maintain the lawn and grounds. A garage standing on the property was rented, providing additional revenue to the library. The library continued to grow, occupying this property for approximately 33 years.

So there you have it, a glimpse into our past. It's fun to recall our early beginnings and appreciate all of the changes. Fast forward to the present and we find that statistics show one out of three households in Stow and Munroe Falls used the library in 2021. The library had 90,483 visitors in 2021 with an average of 303 visitors walking through the doors every day the library was open. Items borrowed reached a total of 520,541 last year. And these are all statistics gathered during the pandemic, which proved to be one of the most interesting times in library history.
